GREEN TIPS: Paperless Billing There are pros and cons to paperless billing, but the pros easily outweigh the cons when it comes to both clutter and environmental impact. A paperless bill only clogs your email inbox (a topic for another day) whereas a paper bill clutters your desk. And saving paper means not only saving trees, but 171 pounds of greenhouse gases, 63 gallons of water, and 4.5 gallons of gasoline annually for the average paperless household, according to Pay It Green, a coalition of financial institutions and businesses promoting paperless billing. NURSES' NOTES

Under the limit---and the influence:
For years it's been illegal to drive anywhere in the United States with a blood alcohol concentration above 0.08 percent. Now a study suggests that *no* amount of alcohol is safe for motorists. Researchers at the University of California San Diego reviewed 14 years of accident data and found that **even people who were barely buzzed were almost 37 percent more likely than sober drivers to be in a serious or fatal crash.** "A blood alcohol concentration of just 0.01 percent was associated with risky behaviors such as speeding," says lead researcher David P. Phillips, PhD. "For a 180-pound person, that translates to one glass of wine or a bottle of beer. " If you're planning to be on the road, skip the after-dinner cocktail or raise a toast to the designated driver. (BHG, Nov. 2011)
